CENTRAL IDEA QUESTION STRATEGIES

The Central Idea covers the OVERALL details introduced in the text.

(The Central Idea does **NOT** focus on specific details or introduce new ideas.)

STRATEGY: IDENTIFY the central idea and DEFINE in 3-6 words*

Steps to Answering Central Idea Questions

Step 1: HIGHLIGHT/UNDERLINE (See the *Reading Non-Fiction Handout*)

- First and Last Sentences
- Birthday Words but, instead, rather, though, however, despite, although, yet. Central idea is often in the sentences containing a birthday word.
- Weird punctuation—colon, rhetorical question

Step 2: Re-read what you highlighted after you initially read the text. As you re-read your highlighted sentences, ask yourself, "HOW does this sentence develop the Central Idea?" "WHAT is the overarching theme of the text?"

Step 3: Define the Central Idea in 3-6 words (in your head) before looking at the answer choices. Central Idea needs to be SHORT and SIMPLE! The more concise, the quicker and easier it is to check it against the answer choices.

Step 4: Use the HSDQ Answering Multiple Choice Strategies (See handout)
